TESTING REQUIREMENT IN CONNECTION WITH ON-SITE ACTIVITIES

As opposed to the previous recommendation to be tested for Covid-19 frequently, the Danish Parliament's reopening plan requires everyone to present a negative Covid-19 test taken a maximum of 72 hours previously in order to enter campus. This applies to everyone: students, teaching staff participating in the reopening of on-site activities, technical/administrative staff performing on-site work, staff making brief visits to the office etc. It also applies to people who have already obtained permission to work on campus, for example in connection with courses containing practical elements. Documentation may be in either printed or electronic form. For further details, see AU's new subsite with [guidelines for testing](#).

EDUCATION

Remember the interim and final evaluations of this spring's courses

For many of our courses, the time has come for oral interim evaluations. This is an obvious opportunity to find out how things are going. What is working well? And what needs to be adjusted? We all want the students to get as much as possible out of the spring courses despite the current circumstances.

The final digital teaching evaluations are also available on Blackboard. It is now possible for teachers to add their own questions before the evaluations are made available to the students at the end of the course. Please note that digital

evaluations on Blackboard can only be made available to the students once, so they should not be used until the final teaching evaluation.

Gaining input from the evaluations is an important part of the development of individual courses and entire degree programmes. Therefore, it is essential that as many students as possible evaluate the teaching in order to have an impact on the quality development. As a teacher, you can help by encouraging your students to complete the evaluation.

DID YOU KNOW THAT...

New procedure for travel insurance cards at AU

The travel insurance provider Europæiske has introduced a new solution for travel insurance cards which makes it possible to print your own insurance card directly from their website. This will replace the use of the physical plastic cards. Therefore, AU will now start using this solution and abandon the use of plastic cards.

It is not a requirement to own or bring a physical card in order to be covered by Europæiske's travel insurance for Danish government employees. When initiating an insurance claim, confirmation from the head of school, deputy director etc. must be included, and the print-it-yourself solution is therefore just as safe as the use of a plastic card, as the claim procedure makes it impossible for unauthorised persons to take advantage of the print-it-yourself solution. If you need to use the insurance during a trip abroad and you do not have the physical card, all the necessary information and contact information can be found at <https://www.europaeiske.dk/statens-tjenesterejseforsikring/>.

Employees who already have a physical plastic card may choose to keep it. At the end of your employment, the card must be destroyed.

Research projects and notification requirements

This is a reminder that you are required to notify Aarhus University of any research projects you are conducting in which you handle personal data.

If your research project contains personal data, you must register your project in AU's internal project overview.

It is important that you register your project and that you familiarise yourself with the guidelines for handling personal data in all types of project. And this applies not only to large, externally funded projects, but also to small projects carried out in your own research time.

Irrespective of the type of project in question, the project manager is responsible for the following issues with regard to personal data:

- You are the internal data controller for the project. In other words, you have overall responsibility for ensuring that AU's rules are complied with and that the project data is used in accordance with the Danish Act on the Processing of Personal Data.

- You must ensure that the project is registered and initiate the completion of all the necessary documentation, for example declarations of consent and data processor agreements.

It is also important that the IT equipment used in the project is updated and encrypted.

Erasmus+ Strategic Partnership applications 2021

Erasmus+ is the EU's education programme. The Strategic Partnership programme supports development and knowledge-sharing collaborations in the field of education. Education is the main focus of this type of application. So all members of staff are encouraged to inform their head of department if they are interested in joining the Strategic Partnership programme. The aim is to find out whether we can give organisational support to help our degree programmes to benefit from the programme; and if so, how this can be done.

When approaching your head of department, please outline briefly the project's objective and its relevance for the degree programme concerned, as well as estimating the time AU will have to invest in it.

Erasmus+ projects are characterised by very little external funding to cover time consumption, so staff need to be prepared to commit a good deal of their research time to such projects. Researchers who are considering joining an Erasmus+ project are welcome to contact research consultant Pernille Roholt (pero@cc.au.dk) for advice about how much of their research time they will need to invest in any such project before committing themselves.

The Augustinus Foundation supports research in cultural heritage

Deadline 16 June 2021 at 12:00

The Augustinus Foundation has earmarked DKK 60 million to support research in cultural heritage in the period 2021-2023 and aims to allocate between DKK 500,000 and DKK 5 million per application.

The focus is on developing knowledge within key areas relating to cultural history such as archaeology, music, performing arts, visual arts and literature. It also aims to support small classical languages as well as original Scandinavian languages which can contribute to the understanding of Danish cultural heritage.

Applications related to major research projects with several partners, interdisciplinary collaborations between research institutions, e.g. museums and universities, and projects that promote the internationalisation of Danish research will be given positive consideration. Support is provided for high-quality projects with a clear communication profile, whose content is of strategic importance for the research institution.

Independent Research Fund Denmark – Inge Lehmann programme

Deadline 17 June 2021 at 12:00

In 2021, DKK 110 million have been allocated to the Inge Lehmann programme, which aims to strengthen talent development in Danish research by promoting a higher degree of gender equality in academia in Denmark. Read more about the programme [here](#).

Please note the following:

- **Budget**

In 2021, a total of DKK 110 million, including overheads, have been earmarked for the programme. An Inge Lehmann grant may be **up to DKK 2 million, excluding overheads**, and a total of 30-40 grants are expected to be awarded in 2021.

- **Purpose**

The purpose is to strengthen talent development in Danish research by promoting a higher degree of gender equality in academia in Denmark. The programme is open to all fields of study and to both men and women, but through dispensation in accordance with section 3 of the Gender Equality Act (*ligestillingsloven*), the **Independent Research Fund Denmark will generally choose female rather than male applicants** in cases where both are equally qualified.

- **Applicants**

Applicants must be employed as assistant professor/associate professor, researcher/senior researcher or senior associate professor at a Danish research institution – if an employment agreement has been made within one of the above job categories, but the position has not yet been taken up, a letter of appointment must be enclosed.

Applicants must have obtained a PhD degree or equivalent qualifications (e.g. positive assistant professor assessment) within a **minimum of three and a maximum of six years** at the deadline for submitting applications. After obtaining the PhD degree, the applicant must have gained **significant independent research experience**

Applicants must **be employed** at a Danish research institution **during the entire project period**.

This may now be possible. NetLab advertises a number of full-time IT developer support weeks for Danish researchers studying phenomena on the web – both the live web that you want to archive, and the web that is already in an existing web archive.

NetLab is part of the national Danish research infrastructure DIGHUMLAB, and it supports researchers who want to study the archived web, either as something to be archived by the researcher or as it is found in an existing web archive such as the national Danish web archive Netarkivet (archives the entire Danish web, established 2005) or the US-based Internet Archive.
