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HEAD OF SCHOOL

Dear all,

Let me start by wishing you a Happy New Year once again. I hope you have all returned to work refreshed after a good holiday.

I am delighted to report that Carsten Stage, an associate professor at the Department of Scandinavian Studies and Experience Economy, has agreed to join the school management team as deputy head of school as of 1 February 2022. He will be assuming special responsibility for research and external collaboration. Carsten has been one of the programme directors of the Cultural Transformations programme since 2017 and knows all about the way we organise our research. He is currently the PI of a project entitled "PeerCare – Producing continuity of care in peer-led online communities for patients with chronic conditions", and his work generally focuses on cultural participation, health culture and the narratives of illness in social media. He will be joining the school management team, which still consists of our nine heads of department (Lise Skytte Jakobsen, Jakob Ladegaard, Steen Kaargaard Nielsen, Anne Marit Waade, Morten Breinbjerg, Joshua Skewes, Dominic Rainsford, Kirsten Wølch Rasmussen and Stefan Kjerkegaard), as well as secretariat manager Tine Arsinevici, director of studies Lars Kiel Bertelsen and deputy head of school Jody Pennington.

A new semester starts very soon: new courses, syllabuses, workshops, lectures and all the other ingredients of our normal teaching activities. Even though the situation is unusual owing to the high rate of Covid-19 infections in Denmark, I hope everyone has a great semester. At AU we will continue to observe all the official guidelines, which means that our teaching will be conducted as normally as possible. We must all join forces to do our best with this situation; and if you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact your head of department or secretariat manager.

The Ministry of Higher Education and Science has just announced that the restrictions applying to higher education are to be extended until 31 January 2022. We will of course keep you informed as soon as we know more. This means that our administration and research will continue to be done mainly from home, and meetings and other activities will remain online. I know that our secretariats, departments and research programmes are really good at facilitating successful meetings, workshops and seminars online. It's not the same as meeting face to face, but a lot of people have managed to have good discussions and develop alternative activities all the same. For instance, we had to conduct our workshops on research integrity online in December. Hans Fink, who is a consultant for the responsible conduct of research and the freedom of research at AU, made an excellent presentation, which was followed by a discussion of a wide range of relevant topics relating to the conduct of research and new and old

dilemmas including plagiarism/auto-plagiarism, data management, co-publication and external collaborations. Thank you for all your many contributions – we will be reviewing the format and content of the workshop in the research committee and school management team and will be discussing how to follow up on the many issues that were raised. All eight Danish universities have now submitted their proposals for the relocation of degree programmes and a reduction in the number of study places. We must now wait for a response from the politicians, so at the moment I can't say much about the potential consequences. None of us wanted this to happen; but as soon as the politicians announce their decision, we will have to roll up our sleeves and help to find the best possible processes and solutions to cope with this difficult situation.

And we won't be bored in the meantime! The teaching starts soon, generating a lot of work for the academic and technical/administrative staff alike. But there are also research projects, collaborations and management tasks to keep us busy. When I check the head of school's mailbox each morning, I can see the vast number of projects and tasks in which you are all engaged. There are simply so many initiatives you are keen to take either individually or alongside your colleagues, so many issues you want to discuss. Many thanks for all your hard work and enthusiasm.

Registering publications in PURE

Please remember that the final deadline for registering work published in 2021 is 15 January 2022.

Before registering publications in PURE, you need to check the following:

- Have all your publications been registered in PURE? It's a good idea to check the overview on your AU website.
- Have any of your publications changed publication status since you registered them?
- Have your publications been registered under the correct categories (research, communication, consultancy and teaching)?
- Is the peer-review status of your publications correct?
- Is the Open Access status of relevant publications correct? If you are in any doubt about what Open Access means for you, please contact [AU Library](#).

Applicants expressing an interest in such projects will receive a reply in mid-April, after which selected applicants will be invited to submit a full application. DKK 30 million has been set aside in 2022.
